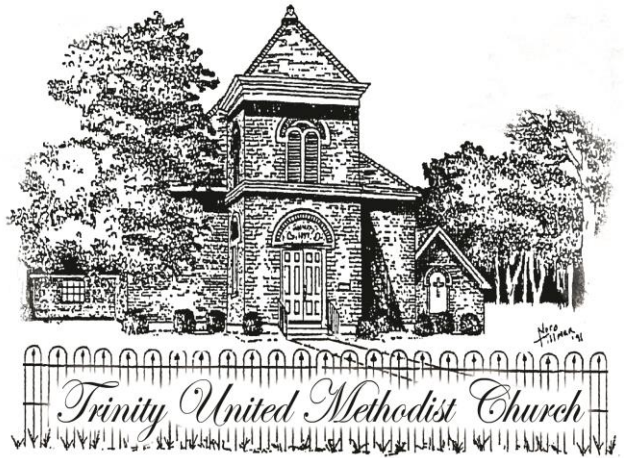

A word about Advent, Wreathes, and Candles

This Sunday, December 3, we will begin the season of Advent.

Some may not be familiar with the term “Advent” — It is a season of the church year – The beginning of the church year – The first 4 Sundays of the Church Year; the 4 Sundays before Christmas.

The Word “advent” means “*coming*”- as in someone important, a King, who is coming for a visit

The main themes of Advent are waiting and preparing. -- Waiting and preparing for the coming of Christ.

--The Hebrews still wait for the Messiah to be born. -- We wait and prepare to celebrate the coming of the messiah who *has come* as a baby, born in a stable in Bethlehem.

-- Jesus promised that one day he will return, so we wait and prepare to meet the messiah who *is coming* again

-- And Jesus is *always coming* to us in fresh, new ways every day, and so during Advent we prepare to meet the one who comes to us anew today.

There are many traditions associated with Advent. One of those traditions is the Advent wreath and candles. We mark time as we light candles each week, one this week ... two next week ..., three the next week ... - recognizing the anticipation of lighting all four candles, and it becomes a symbol of our waiting and preparing for the fullness of Christ who has come, who is coming again, and who comes daily to set things right.....

The Advent Wreath tradition began in Germany (some say began as pagan practice) adapted by the Lutheran churches perhaps in the mid-1600’s. The tradition spread to this country in the 1930’s and 40’s Used almost exclusively in Liturgical style worship until very recent times when adapted by more congregational and charismatic congregations.

The wreath is symbolic:

Wreath of greenery—eternal life in Christ

Circular—eternity of God

Candles—Christ, the light of the world—and the light of God that shines in darkness

The candles are usually purple or blue signifying royalty and penitence—

Some congregations use Red candles symbolizing the blood of Christ

Some churches use white candles signifying purity

Sometimes one candle is rose/pink colored (used 1/2 way through advent) to symbolize joy

No “official” meaning is given to the candles. They are an aid to worship and reflect the themes of the Season of advent.—waiting, preparing,

Different churches and congregations assign different meanings to the candles: meanings reflecting various aspects of God or aspects of life of faith.

Some traditions focus on waiting—each candle represents 1000 years from Adam and Eve to time of Christ

Other possibilities:

- prophesy, Bethlehem, shepherds, angels
- Mercy, Love, grace, power,
- Prayer, Penitence, Patience, Promise
- I read of one church where the candles were symbols of: Shepherds, the Magi, Angels, Joseph and Mary.

Each week in worship they would place figures from nativity as the candle was lit. Finally, on Christmas Eve the Christ candle was lit as the figure of the infant was placed in the manger of the creche’.

Generally the four candles represent Hope, Peace, Joy ,Love.

This Sunday we will renew the tradition of lighting a candle on the Advent wreath as we wait and prepare for the coming of Christ.

Is there some unfinished business in your life that needs to be taken care of? – some relationship that needs to be healed – some invitation that needs to be made – some gift that needs to be given – or received? Is there anything about which you would be embarrassed or ashamed if Jesus were to come today?
